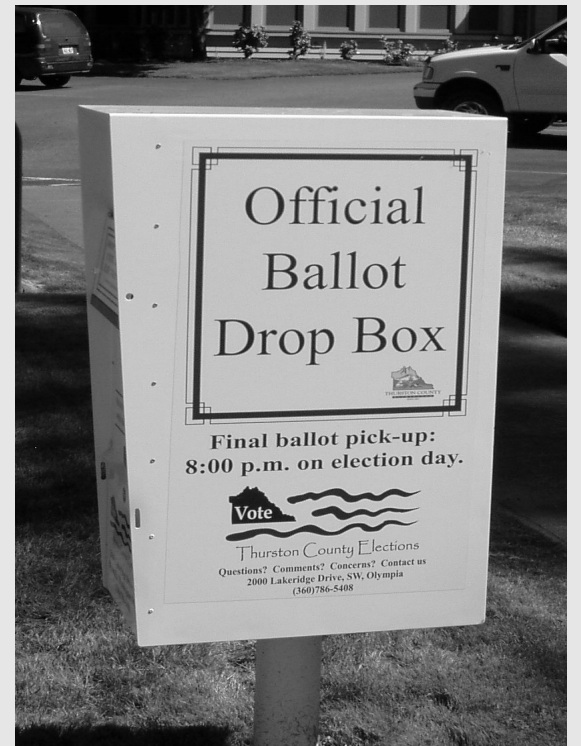

Why Didn't I Get a Ballot? Where is the Commissioner's Race? Answers to These Top-2 Primary Questions.

Not all voters in Thurston County will participate in the August 18, 2009 Primary Election. To be eligible to vote on a race or issue in the Primary, you must reside within the district. For example, only voters who live within Commissioner District No. 3 will be eligible to vote on the Thurston County and Port of Olympia Commissioner races (see page 4 for Commissioner Map). All Thurston County voters will vote on these positions in November.

In this year's Top-2 Primary, more than two candidates must file for an office to have a Primary.

If less than three candidates filed for an office, the office is scheduled to appear on the General Election ballot in November. After the August Primary Election, the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes in each race, regardless of party preference (in partisan races), will advance to the General Election.

A candidate's preference does not imply that the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party, or that the party approves of or associates with that candidate.
