Dear Candidate:

Congratulations on your decision to run for office. This Candidate Guide contains information you will need at every step of your candidacy, including which positions are on the ballot, important election dates, filing information, and more.

Candidate Filing Week is coming soon. You may file in our office daily beginning Monday, June 6 through Friday, June 10, from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. It is helpful to us if you turn in your voters' pamphlet candidate statement and photo at the time of filing. Online filing through our website will also be available at www.ThurstonVotes.org. See page 5 for more information.

Nonpartisan races will have a Primary only when more than two candidates file for an office, except for the Superior Court Judge position. If only one candidate files for the Superior Court position, they are deemed elected and no Primary or General Election is held. If two or more candidates file for the judge position and one candidate receives a majority vote (50% + 1) in the Primary, he or she is deemed elected and issued a certificate of election. No General Election would be held. If no candidate receives 50% + 1, the top two candidates advance to the General Election.

Our office has a variety of information you may find useful. Precinct maps are available online at www.ThurstonVotes.org or may be purchased in our office for \$.15 per page. We also have voter registration reports, which include walking lists, voter turnout information, election results by precinct, and more. Page 21 has a sample form used to order voter information.

Once again, congratulations on your decision to run for office. If you have questions concerning the election process, please contact our Elections Division at (360) 786-5408. Good luck with your campaign.

Filing for Office

Declaration of Candidacy

(RCW 29A.20.021, RCW 29A.24)

All candidates are required to submit a Declaration of Candidacy to the appropriate filing officer when filing for public office. The filing officer is the person with whom a candidate files for office or withdraws from candidacy.

A person filing a Declaration of Candidacy for an office shall, at the time of filing, possess the qualifications specified by law for persons who may be elected to the office. The candidate must be properly registered to vote in the district represented by the office at the time of filing. The officer with whom declarations are filed shall review each declaration for compliance with this law.

At the time of filing, a candidate's voter registration data will be checked. If there are discrepancies, corrections to the voter registration file must be completed before the Declaration of Candidacy can be accepted. When filing for an office, candidates are not permitted to use a nickname that denotes present or past occupation, military rank, the candidate's position on issues or political affiliation, or use a nickname designed to intentionally mislead voters. A candidate's last name must match the last name under which he/she is registered to vote.

A filing fee equal to 1% of the salary of the position a person is filing for is required. If there is no salary, then there is no filing fee. No refunds will be given (RCW 29A.24.091, 31). Please see RCW 29A.24.091, 101, 111, RCW 29A.84.261 for filing petition requirements, procedures, and penalties for improper signing.

Where and When to File Declarations of Candidacy (RCW 29A.24.070)

In Person (June 6-10, 2011, M - F 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.)

All candidates file with the Thurston County Auditor's Office, 2000 Lakeridge Dr. SW, Building One, Room 106, Olympia, WA 98502.

Online (June 6-10, 2011)

For filing with Thurston County Auditor's Office go to: www.ThurstonVotes.org beginning Monday, June 6 at 9:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on Friday, June 10.

Mail-in (May 20 - June 10, 2011)

Any candidate may mail in a Declaration of Candidacy for an office starting May 20. Any declaration received prior to that day will be returned and the candidate shall be permitted to re-submit their declaration during the filing period. Postmarks are not accepted. All mail-in declarations must include the filing fee, if applicable (RCW 29A.24.081).

Declared Write-in Candidates (RCW 29A.24.311)

Declared write-in candidates will be charged a filing fee, if applicable, and will be required to file a Declaration of Candidacy not later than the day before the Primary or General Election.

Votes for write-in candidates are tabulated and reported as a combined number for each race. The votes for individual write-in candidates are only identified and reported if the total number of write-in votes cast is enough to make a difference in the outcome of the race.

Position Descriptions/Qualifications

Superior Court Judge: A candidate must be a registered voter in the county and a member of the Washington State Bar.

The office will appear on the Primary ballot if two candidates file for the position. If only one candidate files for the position of Superior Court Judge, he/she will be deemed elected and issued a Certificate of Election. If two or more candidates file for the position and one receives a majority (50% + 1) of the votes at the Primary Election, he or she will be deemed elected and issued a Certificate of Election. If no one receives a majority (50% + 1) of the votes in the Primary Election, only the top two vote-getters will advance to the General Election ballot.

Port of Olympia

Port districts are empowered to levy taxes and special local improvement assessments, to promote economic development, to create incidental park and recreation facilities, to adopt and enforce regulations relating to moorage and toll facilities, and to cooperate with counties and cities in applying general police and traffic regulations to port properties and operations. The commissioners set objectives, policies, and over-all port direction through comprehensive plans. The port manages 1,650 acres of land including the Olympia Airport, Swantown Marina, New Market facilities site, and a modern marine terminal.

The three-member port commission serves as the board of directors for the Port of Olympia, a municipal corporation. Each commissioner represents a district within Thurston County. Commissioners are voted upon by district in the Primary Election. All voters cast a ballot for each commissioner in the General Election. The term of office is four years.

Cities and Towns (Types of City Government):

There are two principal forms of city government in Thurston County: mayor-council and council-manager. Under both the mayor-council and council-manager forms of government, the council is the city's legislative and policy-making body. All council members are elected.

The council enacts all ordinances, resolutions, and policies consistent with state law for the safety and welfare of the city's or town's residents. Ordinances may include local tax measures authorized by statute. Traffic, fire protection, police, land use, municipal services, business, and other regulations are overseen by the council. The council controls the city's finances through the budgeting and auditing processes and by exercising general oversight. The council also makes contracts, creates subordinate positions, prescribes duties, and fixes salaries. The mayor's role depends upon the form of government in a particular city or town.

A. Mayor-Council: Bucoda, Rainier, Tenino, Tumwater, and Yelm

In the mayor-council form of government, the mayor is elected and is the city's chief executive or administrative officer and the ceremonial head of the city. The mayor carries out the council's policies, administers day-to-day city affairs, and with some limitations, appoints, supervises, and discharges subordinate officers. The mayor presides over council meetings and has a veto power over ordinances.

B. Council-Manager: Lacey and Olympia

In the council-manager form of government, the council appoints a city manager as the chief administrative officer. The manager appoints and discharges all department heads and subordinate officers and is responsible to the council for the proper administration of all city affairs. The council may discharge the manager but may not interfere with or bypass the manager's day-to-day administration of subordinates. A council member is selected by the council, or by an alternative election method, to act as chairman with the title of "mayor". The mayor continues to be a full member of the council with all attendant rights, privileges, and immunities. The mayor also presides over council meetings and acts as the ceremonial head of the city. The mayor has no regular administrative powers but may be required to exercise certain powers in emergencies.

Position Descriptions/Qualifications

School Board Directors

Thurston County is divided into nine separate school districts, each governed by a five-member board. The board's responsibilities include budget, policy development, classroom instruction, planning, and communications. School board directors delegate authority for day-to-day functions to professional staff; however, they may never delegate ultimate responsibility.

Board members are elected in a nonpartisan General Election by voters within that school district. They receive no salary. A board may approve a per diem compensation for its members for attending board meetings. In most districts, candidates must reside in the sub-district for which they are seeking office. All candidates are elected by the voters of the entire school district.

Fire Protection District/Regional Fire Authority Commissioners

Fire protection/regional fire authority districts are formed to provide fire prevention services, fire suppression, emergency medical services, and the protection of life and property for district residents. Administrative authority for the district results from decisions made by a board of elected fire commissioners.

The board of commissioners has the authority to hire and appoint employees as well as administer all aspects of the district. The board is required to hold regular monthly meetings. Fire protection districts levy regular property taxes to provide services to the public. Additionally, with voter approval, the board may issue bonds and make excess levies for specific purposes.

The voters elect commissioners to staggered six-year terms. The nonpartisan commissioners receive no regular salary but may choose to receive nominal compensation for attending meetings.

Park and Recreation District Commissioners

State law allows for the formation of park and recreation districts as municipal corporations for the purpose of providing recreational activities of a non-profit nature as a public service to the residents of the geographical areas included within district boundaries. Park district commissions consist of a five-member nonpartisan board elected within the jurisdiction to serve staggered four-year terms.

These districts may acquire property, make contracts, establish changes, make rules governing park property, and manage and operate recreational facilities, according to RCW 36.69.130. They may also impose property taxes, establish local improvement districts, and issue revenue bonds, subject to the restrictions contained in RCW Chapter 36.69.

Cemetery District Commissioners

Thurston County has two operating cemetery districts, District No. 1 in Grand Mound and District No. 2 in Yelm. The districts consist of a three-member nonpartisan commission elected within the jurisdictions to serve staggered six-year terms. The commission is non-salaried but may be reimbursed for expenses.

Under state law, a commission is empowered to make and carry out contracts and to acquire, improve, and operate cemeteries. It establishes fees and regulations for their use.

The budget is prepared by the district commission and certified by the board of county commissioners. The county treasurer receives and disburses all revenues and maintains a cemetery fund for the district. Funding comes from revenue received through the sale of cemetery lots, from the district's share of the junior taxing district levies, and also from private donations.

Thurston County Local Voters' Pamphlet - Rules for Candidate Statements/Photos

Deadline for Submission of Statements and Photographs

Any candidate who wishes to have a statement and photograph appear in the Thurston County Local Voters' Pamphlet must submit such material to the Thurston County Auditor's Office, Elections Division. Statements and photographs are due the Monday following filing week. All material will be date stamped upon receipt.

Candidates advancing from the Primary Election to the General Election shall have an opportunity to revise their statements for inclusion in the General Election Local Voters' Pamphlet. Photos used in the Primary Election Local Voters' Pamphlet will remain the same for the General Election Local Voters' Pamphlet.

Deadlines for statement revisions shall be established by the County Auditor's Office and provided to candidates at the time of filing. Candidates who are defeated in the Primary Election shall not have their statements appear in the General Election Local Voters' Pamphlet.

Statement Length

Statements submitted by candidates shall be limited to no more than 150 words and no more than four (4) hard returns.

Each individual word is counted as one word. All words contained within hyphenated words or phrases shall count individually with the exception of prefixes. Website addresses and prefixes such as pre-date, mid-January, or pre-Revolutionary count as one word. Words separated by a "/" are counted as two words. All material in excess of the 150 word limit, counting from the end of the statement, will be omitted. If such a deletion creates an incomplete sentence at the end of the statement, that incomplete sentence will also be omitted. The Auditor's Office may attempt to contact candidates to shorten their statements, if time permits, but is under no obligation to do so. There will be no exception to these limitations.

Contact information for each candidate shall be included in the pamphlet without inclusion in the 150 word limit. Contact information is limited to the candidate's phone number, physical or mailing address, email address, and/or web address.

Candidates should include this information with submission of their statements. Website addresses will be counted as ONE word, if used as part of the candidate statement. If the candidate does not provide contact information with his or her statement, the Auditor's Office will use the information provided on his or her candidate filing paperwork.

Statement Submission Standards

In order to maintain good standards of readability and to ensure accuracy in typesetting this material for publication, the following standards have been established:

1. Candidate statements shall be typed.
2. The candidate's contact information: name, address, telephone number, email and web address along with the office sought, should appear at the top of the statement. The contact information will be published in the pamphlet as submitted.
3. The material shall be set in paragraph style. Due to pamphlet space limitations, lists of items which require multiple indentations, including bullets, are not permitted. Items which are submitted as multiple indents will be combined by the Auditor's Office in line format with semicolons separating each item.
4. Words, phrases, and sentences which are emphasized by italics, underlining, capital letters, or bold print will be typeset in italics. We recommend candidates avoid such emphasis, as it reduces the readability of the statement.

5. The candidate's campaign contact information should be clearly indicated following the text of the candidate's 150 word statement. Campaign contact information will be printed in the Local Voters' Pamphlet to enable voters to contact the candidate or the candidate's campaign.

Statement Content

The Auditor's Office shall reject any candidate's statement deemed to be libelous or otherwise inappropriate (See Rejection of Statements). Statements submitted must pertain to the individual candidate and his or her candidacy, the office he or she is seeking, and/or the jurisdiction in which he or she lives. It is the responsibility of the candidate to ensure all information contained in his or her statement is true and accurate. The Auditor's Office does not check statements for factual accuracy.

Statement content suggestions: occupation, education, professional qualifications, why the candidate seeks the office, what ideas the candidate has, if elected, length of residence in the county, city, town, or district, additional personal information, and community involvement.

Editing Statements

In a publication of this magnitude, it is inevitable that the material submitted for publication will contain some inadvertent errors of spelling, punctuation, or syntax, which would adversely affect the readability of the statement and improperly reflect on the candidate. The County Auditor may correct such incidental errors, as long as this does not affect the content of the statement. This office is not obligated, however, to make such corrections and assumes no responsibility for errors which result from inaccuracies in the original statement submitted by the candidate.

Rejection of Statements for the Local Voters' Pamphlet

The County Auditor will reject statements which contain obscene, vulgar, or profane language, or any language which in any way incites, counsels, promotes, or advocates hatred, abuse, violence, and/or hostility toward or which tends to bring ridicule or shame upon a person or group of persons by reason of sex, race, color, sexual orientation, or religion.

If any portion of the candidate's statement is rejected, only that rejected portion may be rewritten and submitted for inclusion in the statement.

Appeal of Rejected Statements

Candidates will be notified if their statements, or any portion thereof, have been rejected. They will be given an opportunity to appeal that rejection or resubmit a statement or revision of the portion which has been rejected. Due to time constraints, a second rejection is final.

Appeals will be made to the County Auditor, who has three (3) business days to respond to the appeal. The Auditor has the final decision in the acceptance and rejection of statements.

Proofing of Statements

To ensure maximum accuracy in the publication of candidate statements, the County Auditor shall provide a proof copy of each statement to the candidate prior to publication. It is the responsibility of the candidate to sign off on the proof copy and notify the County Auditor of any corrections or misprints immediately if changes are necessary.

Candidates will not be permitted to amend the content of their original statements after a proof has been provided. Only the correction of incidental errors in spelling, punctuation, or syntax **in the original statement or errors in typesetting** will be allowed.

Thurston County Local Voters' Pamphlet - Rules for Candidate Statements/Photos

Candidate Photographs

Candidates may submit photographs to be included with their statements. To assure the best possible reproduction, all photographs should be:

1. Digital photographs are preferred in either .jpg, .tiff, or .psd formats. Color photos will be converted to black and white. Digital photographs as part of a Word document or PDF are not acceptable.
2. Hard copy pictures shall be no smaller than 3 x 5 inches or larger than 5 x 7 inches. Digital photos should be no larger than 1124 x 1280 pixels or smaller than 740 x 800 pixels.
3. Limited to the head and shoulders of the candidate (frontal view of the candidate). To achieve best contrast, we recommend that you use a photograph with a light (not white) background. Backgrounds should be neutral - no buildings, landscape, or props, (e.g., flags). Do not include other persons in your photograph.
4. No more than five years old.
5. Free from any insignia or clothing which designates the candidate's present elected office, or any uniform or insignia of any organization which advocates or teaches racial, religious, or any other type of intolerance.

It is preferred that photos be electronically submitted using the formats listed above. Do not embed photos in a PDF or Word document. If candidates wish to receive their photos back after publication, they must notify the Auditor's Office at the time of submission.

Statement and Photograph Costs

No cost shall be charged to candidates submitting material to be included in the Local Voters' Pamphlet. The cost of the Local Voters' Pamphlet shall be considered an election cost to those local jurisdictions included in the pamphlet, and the cost shall be prorated in the manner provided in RCW 29A.04.410.

Statement and Photograph Rules for Candidates Advancing to the General Election

Candidate photographs used in the Primary Election Local Voters' Pamphlet will also be used in the General Election Local Voters' Pamphlet. Primary statements may be revised by those candidates who move forward to the General Election from the Primary Election. The date for revisions will be defined by the Thurston County Auditor.

Political Signs - State and County - Excerpts

State Sign Classifications

In accordance with Washington Administrative Code (WAC) 468-66-050, classification of signs, political signs are considered a Type 3(d) on-premise sign for which no fee or application is necessary. Temporary political signs are signs which express the property owner's endorsement of a political candidate or ballot issue, with the following restrictions:

- Temporary political campaign signs are limited to a maximum size of thirty-two (32) square feet in area.
- Temporary political campaign signs must be removed within ten (10) days after the election.
- Temporary political campaign signs are subject to all other applicable provisions of Chapter 47.42 RCW and Chapter 468-66 WAC that pertain to Type 3 on-premise signs.

In addition to the above restrictions, the posting of advertising signs within the right-of-way of all state highways is illegal. Accordingly, any sign placed within the right-of-way* of any state highway will be removed by the Department of Transportation.

A campaign sign cannot be designed in a manner that resembles an official traffic control sign.

*The road right-of-way includes the paved road and strip of land, usually on either side of the road, that is reserved for shoulders, drainage ditches, sidewalks, traffic signs, electrical traffic signal control boxes, utility lines and future road expansion.

Thurston County Code Title 20.40.020 - General provisions

1. No sign shall protrude over the street right-of-way.
2. No sign shall be erected that interferes with the visibility of traffic control devices or street name signs.
3. Signs may be luminous, reflecting or illuminating, but no sign shall be flashing or oscillating.
4. No sign shall be placed so as to cause visual obstruction of a public right-of-way.
5. All signs shall conform to Washington State statutes or building code, if in effect.

Thurston County Code Title 20.40.035 - Exempt Signs

The following signs shall be permitted and are exempt from the provisions of this chapter, and shall not be included in the computation of sign size area for regulated signs. This shall not be construed as relieving the owner of the sign from the responsibility of its erection and maintenance and its compliance with any other applicable law or ordinance. Exempt signs are:

15. Political campaign signs advertising a candidate or candidates for public elective office, or a political party, or a sign urging a particular vote on a public issue decided by ballot may be erected on any privately owned lot or parcel, excluding right-of-way. Each sign shall be removed within fifteen (15) days after that election. For a successful candidate in a primary election, the sign may remain until the final election but shall be removed within fifteen (15) days after that election. The candidate or committee for which the sign is displayed shall be responsible for its removal and subject to the penalties as provided in this title.

City of Lacey - Excerpts

16.75.020 (AA): Definitions and Abbreviations: "Political sign" means a sign advertising a candidate or candidates for public elective office, or a political party, or sign urging a particular vote on a public issue decided by ballot.

16.75.110 Permitted signs. The following signs are permitted subject to the applicable limitations as noted.

Temporary signs. The following signs are classified as temporary (non-permanent). Temporary signs are permitted subject to the applicable limitations:

5. Political signs. No sign permit is required. Political signs or posters may be placed upon private property only and shall not be larger than ten (10) square feet of sign area and shall not be posted or attached to telephone poles, power poles or other public utility facilities. Such signs must be removed seven (7) days after the election in which the candidate or issue advertised on a sign has been determined. For a successful candidate in a primary election the sign may remain until the final election, but shall be removed within seven (7) days after the election. The candidate or committee for which the sign is displayed shall be responsible for its removal and subject to the penalties as provided in this code.

16.75.150 Illegal Signs.

A. Termination of illegal signs. The right to maintain any sign shall terminate and shall cease to exist whenever the sign is:

1. *Abandoned.* No persons shall maintain or permit to be maintained on any premises owned or controlled by him any sign which has been abandoned.

2. *Damaged or destroyed beyond fifty percent.* The determination whether a sign is damaged or destroyed beyond fifty percent (50%) shall rest with the code administrator and shall be based upon the actual cost of replacing said sign; and/or

3. *Structurally substandard* under any applicable ordinance of the city to the extent that the sign becomes a hazard or a danger.

C. Violation--Penalty.

1. Violation of the provisions of this code or failure to comply with any of its requirements shall constitute a misdemeanor and such violation shall be punished as provided by the statutes of the State of Washington for the commission of a misdemeanor. Each day such violation continues shall be considered a separate offense.

2. The erector, owner or user of an unlawful sign or the owner of the property on which an unlawful sign is located and who maintains such violation may each be found guilty of a separate offense and suffer the penalties herein provided. (Ord. 1053 §§1-2, 1997).

Chapter 18.42.300 - Political Sign Standards

A. Permits - not required.

B. Maximum size of sign surface area:

1. Residential zones (defined in sections 18.42.120(H) and 18.42.140(L)) - 10 square feet.
2. Other districts - 32 square feet.

C. Height. Four (4) foot maximum in residential districts (defined in sections 18.42.120(H) and 18.42.140(L)). In any other district, four (4) feet. In other districts, and outside required residential setbacks, maximum height is 10 feet.

D. Placement. Political signs may not be placed in public parks or attached to traffic safety devices, telephone poles, power poles, or other public utility facilities. They may be placed upon private property or within the public rights-of-way, provided that the sign shall be placed no less than ten feet from the paved edge or traveled portions of the roadway and signs placed within twenty feet of a street corner shall not exceed thirty (30) inches in height within the clear sight triangle. Signs shall not interfere with traffic safety.

E. Removal. All political signs must be removed 5 days after the election in which the candidates or issue on the sign has been determined. However, after primary elections, if the candidate or issue is going into the general election, signs may remain until 5 days after the general election. The candidate or committee for which the sign is displayed, shall be responsible for its removal. The candidate or committee for which the sign is displayed, shall be subject to the penalties and fines for violation of these requirements, as set forth in this title. (Ord. 6093 §17, 2001).

City of Tumwater - Excerpts

18.44.070 Exemptions. The following signs shall be permitted anywhere within the city and are exempt from the permit requirements of this chapter, and shall not be included in the computation of sign size area for regulated signs. This shall not be construed as relieving the owner of the sign from the responsibility of its erection and maintenance and its compliance with any other applicable law or ordinance. Exempt signs are:

(K) Political campaign signs advertising a candidate or candidates for public elective office, or a political party, or a sign urging a particular vote on a public issue decided by ballot may be erected on any privately owned lot or parcel, excluding right-of-way. Each sign shall be removed within fifteen (15) days after that election. For a successful candidate in a primary election, the sign may remain until the final election but shall be removed within fifteen (15) days after that election. The candidate or committee for which the sign is displayed shall be responsible for its removal and subject to the penalties as provided in this title;

18.44.120 Removal. (B) If any temporary sign shall be unlawfully installed, erected or maintained in violation of any provisions of this section, the owner or the person or firm maintaining same shall, upon written notice by the administrative official, make such sign conform to the provisions of this chapter, or shall remove it within two business days. Administrative review shall not be authorized for interpretations regarding temporary signs. In the event compliance is not obtained, enforcement action including the imposition of penalties shall be brought by the City Attorney.

18.64.020 Violation - Penalty. A. Violations of the provisions of this title, or failure to comply with any of its requirements, shall constitute a misdemeanor. Any person, firm or corporation who violates this title or fails to comply with any of its requirements shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than five hundred dollars, and in addition, shall pay all costs and expenses involved in the case. Each day such violation continues shall be considered a separate and distinct offense.

Campaign Guidelines - Ballot Drop Boxes

Restrictions on Campaigning at Ballot Drop Box Sites

Thurston County is a vote-by-mail county and has ballot drop box sites throughout the area (see page 19). Polling place regulations regarding campaign electioneering apply to drop box sites from the time they are opened (20 days before the election) until boxes are closed at 8:00 p.m. on Election Day.

Electioneering is forbidden within 300 feet of a drop box site or polling place (the County Courthouse is a voting center and adheres to the same restrictions). Electioneering also includes the wearing of campaign T-Shirts and buttons.

RCW 29A.84.510 Acts prohibited . . .

On the day of any primary, general, or special election, no person may, within a polling place, or in any public area within three hundred feet of any entrance to such polling place:

- (a) Suggest or persuade or attempt to suggest or persuade any voter to vote for or against any candidate or ballot measure;
 - (b) Circulate cards or handbills of any kind;
 - (c) Solicit signatures to any kind of petition; or
 - (d) Engage in any practice which interferes with the freedom of voters to exercise their franchise or disrupts the administration of the polling place.
- (2) No person may obstruct the doors or entries to a building in which a polling place is located or prevent free access to and from any polling place. Any sheriff, deputy sheriff, or municipal law enforcement officer shall prevent such obstruction, and may arrest any person creating such obstruction.

Campaign Materials

Campaign materials cannot be placed in or on top of mailboxes without paying postage (U.S. Postal Service, Private Express Statute), nor should campaign materials be placed in newspaper delivery tubes. **Please** be courteous to these agencies.



24-Hour Ballot Drop Box Locations

Ballot drop boxes are the most secure method, short of personally delivering ballots to the Auditor's Office, to ensure ballots are received on time. The Thurston County Auditor's Office requests your assistance in getting this message out to voters. When you are out talking to voters, please assure them these boxes are free, safe, and convenient. They are open 24-hours a day for convenience and are emptied regularly by two election staff members. Boxes are opened the day ballots become available and locked promptly at 8:00 p.m. on Election Day so no further ballots may be deposited.

- May attend political fundraising functions
- May attend and be active at political rallies and meetings
- May join and be an active member of a political party or club
- May sign nominating petitions
- May campaign for or against referendum questions, constitutional amendments, or municipal ordinances
- May campaign for or against candidates in partisan elections
- May make campaign speeches for candidates in partisan elections
- May distribute campaign literature in partisan elections
- May hold office in political clubs or parties including serving as a delegate to a convention

Prohibited Activities for Employees

- May not use their official authority or influence to interfere with an election
- May not solicit, accept or receive political contributions unless both individuals are members of the same federal labor organization or employee organization and the one solicited is not a subordinate employee
- May not knowingly solicit or discourage the political activity of any person who has business before the agency
- May not engage in political activity while on duty
- May not engage in political activity in any government office
- May not engage in political activity while using a government vehicle
- May not be candidates for public office in partisan elections
- May not wear political buttons while on duty

Rules on Political Activity

Under the law, State and Local Employees in Federally Aided Programs may not:

- (1) use their official authority or influence for the purpose of interfering with or affecting the results of an election or a nomination for office;
- (2) directly or indirectly coerce, attempt to coerce, command or advise State or local officer or employee to pay, lend, or contribute anything of value to a party, committee, organization, agency, or person for partisan political purposes; or
- (3) be a candidate for public office in a partisan election.

Caution: Activity permitted by Federal law may be restricted or prohibited by State or local law or regulation.
