The proposed addition to the Taylor Shellfish mussel farm in the North Totten Inlet of Thurston County supports local economy, has little to no adverse or long lasting effect on ecologic function of Totten Inlet and is a cultural activity which is parcel to the defining character of Puget Sound.

Emotional connection exists to our natural world. With that connection comes responsibility of ensuring activity of any kind is in consideration of impact. The impacts of proposed mussel farm have been outlined, studied and determined overall to not be an environmental threat to the Totten Inlet according to a five person independent review board of PHDs specializing in water ecology and biology.

The following information has been collected from the Environmental Impact Statement prepared according to standards written in the RCW.

Concerning Local Economy

“The proposed additions to mussel farming will create 8 new full time jobs.”

Concerning Water Velocity

“There would be no significant unavoidable adverse impacts to water circulation as a result of the proposed project.”

Concerning Benthic Activities

“Therefore, the effects of management activities on benthic communities are unlikely to impact forage productivity to a degree that would impair or even influence normal feeding and rearing behavioral patterns in the action area.”

Concerning Southern Resident Killer Whale Population

“Operation of the proposed 58-raft mussel farm would have little or no significant effect on Southern Resident killer whales because of their low level of occurrence in Totten Inlet, and the fact that whales would move away from any human activity disturbance in the immediate vicinity of the mussel rafts. Whales would be more likely to travel in the deeper parts of Totten Inlet.” The same can also be said for the Chinook salmon and critical salmon habitat.

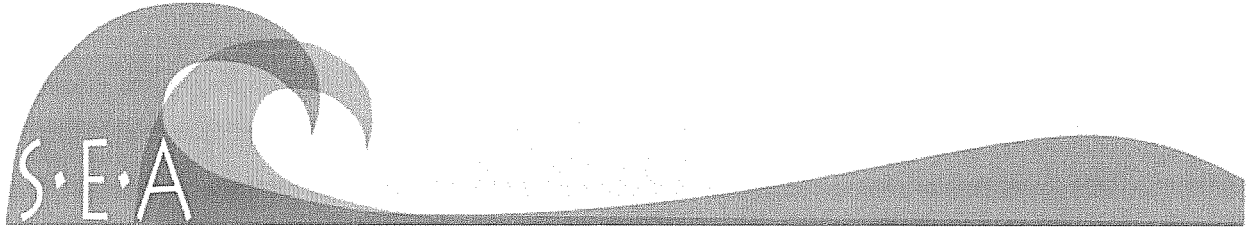
Concerning Navigation and Recreational Boating of Totten Inlet

“The mussel raft would be equipped with required aids to navigation, no significant unavoidable adverse impacts to the navigable waterway would be anticipated.

Concerning Native Mussel Population

“There would be no significant unavoidable adverse impacts to the genetic make-up of native mussel populations in North Totten Inlet as a result of the proposed project with either action alternative.”
