

Letter from the Auditor

Dear Thurston County Voters:

Welcome to the May 18 Special Election Local Voters' Pamphlet. Following the 2000 Presidential Election, Congress passed the Help America Vote Act (HAVA). This made substantial changes to voter registration and ballot tabulation requirements across the country. The first of these changes, a requirement to include your Washington State Driver's License or State I.D. number on your registration, took effect January 1, 2003. Voters who registered after this date may be required to show I.D. at the polls in the September Primary Election, or to include copies of their I.D. with their Absentee Ballots. If you registered to vote after January 1st, and are unsure if you met these identification requirements, call the Elections Department at (360)786-5408.

In addition, the HAVA will bring many changes to Thurston County. My office is actively working on replacing the County's punch card ballots with a system known as Optical Scan. This Special Election may be the last time our County utilizes Punch Card ballots.

This is the largest special election Local Voters' Pamphlet the Auditor's Office has produced. We are pleased to provide this valuable information to you, and hope that it assists you in casting an informed vote.

The Board of County Commissioners of Thurston County adopted Resolution No. 13057 concerning a proposition to issue general obligation bonds for the acquisition, construction and equipping of a regional criminal justice center. This proposition would authorize the County to acquire, construct and equip a 640-bed jail and four nonjury courtrooms, improve seven courtrooms in the existing County courthouse, and renovate the County's existing jail, and issue general obligation bonds in the principal amount of \$88,000,000, maturing within a maximum of 25 years, and levy property taxes annually, in addition to regular tax levies, to repay such bonds.



Thurston County Regional Justice Center Proposition No. 1 General Obligation Bonds - \$88,000,000

Official Ballot Title:

The Board of County Commissioners of Thurston County adopted Resolution No. 13057 concerning a proposition to issue general obligation bonds for the acquisition, construction and equipping of a regional criminal justice center. This proposition would authorize the County to acquire, construct and equip a 640-bed jail and four nonjury courtrooms, improve seven courtrooms in the existing County courthouse, and renovate the County's existing jail, and issue general obligation bonds in the principal amount of \$88,000,000, maturing within a maximum of 25 years, and levy property taxes annually, in addition to regular tax levies, to repay such bonds.

Statement For:

We need a new jail and justice center. The jail now routinely holds five times the number of inmates it was originally designed to house. It's a money pit, beleaguered with repair after repair.

It Is Not Safe

It's not safe for the officers and inmates. It's not safe for the nurses, chaplains, counselors, trainers and community volunteers who work there. It's especially not safe for the rest of us who can no longer count on crooks being locked up because an overcrowded jail forces us to let them loose.

No Vacancy Means No Accountability

We now have 7,500 outstanding warrants in Thurston County. People who commit crimes aren't being held accountable. The Drug Court alternative only works if there is jail space to deal with non-compliance. Meanwhile, we're shipping inmates to jails in other counties at prices we have no control over. And, we're letting people loose who should be locked up for our safety.

More Expensive To Put It Off

There are 104,700 more residents now than when the jail was built in 1978. As our community population grows, so too does the need for new jails and courts. We can't ignore it. The problem won't go away. The longer we wait the more expensive it will get. And our community will be even less safe if the bad guys aren't held accountable. We must solve this problem.

Public Safety Comes First

Protecting our families from crime is one of local government's most important responsibilities. Let's keep our families, neighborhoods and communities safe.

Rebuttal of Statement Against:

Jail opponents offer no practical alternatives. A three year community process has produced a workable, affordable solution that needs to be acted on now to keep us safe.

It is designed to meet future needs, promote programs to discourage repeat offenders and provide treatment for mentally ill persons who commit crimes. Our criminal justice system cannot succeed without adequate jails and safe courts. Protect public safety, vote yes for the Thurston Justice Center.

Thurston County Regional Justice Center Proposition No. 1 - Continued

Explanatory Statement:

This proposition would authorize Thurston County to issue \$88,000,000 in general obligation bonds for the purpose of constructing a regional justice center. The bonds would mature within 25 years with interest and principal payable out of annual property tax levies. The regional justice center would be constructed on 27 acres in the Mottman Industrial Park in Tumwater and would include a 640 bed correctional facility, municipal and district court courtrooms and offices for the courts, prosecution and defense staff. Inmates now housed at the existing County and City facilities would move to the new facility and the existing jail would be renovated and used for holding inmates waiting for jury trials and providing reserve capacity for 80-90 inmates. In addition, the Superior Court courtrooms in the existing County courthouse would be remodeled and two courtrooms that are currently used by district court would be converted to Superior Court courtrooms.

Statement Against:

Let's think this through.

~ The current proposal will *not* solve overcrowding. ~ Officials admit the new jail would be nearly full when opened in 2008. ~ Thurston County has not implemented specific professional recommendations for efficiently reducing jail population. ~ Our jail population increased *nearly four times as fast* as county population. ~ Jails are like closets. The more space you have, the more you'll keep filling it up. ~ We *cannot* build our way out of this problem!

\$103 million is fiscally irresponsible.

~ This is just Phase I. Two more expansions – with additional taxes – would follow unless we stop now and *choose better solutions*. ~ \$88 million bond issue plus \$15 million sales tax would pay only for construction. Operating it would cost millions more every year. ~ Criminal justice already consumes 76% of the county's general fund. Where would extra operating funds come from? Increase taxes? Cut county services? ~ If this passes, will overloaded taxpayers vote

against schools, parks, buses, libraries and other community needs?

Cost-effective solutions exist.

~ Streamlined procedures and cost-effective programs *would* relieve crowding. ~ Jail is an expensive revolving door for people whose problems stem from poverty, mental illness, drugs or alcohol. ~ Instead of jailing so many people, let's use proven programs that save money, reduce crime, and protect society: Drug Court, Mental Health Court, mental/drug/alcohol treatment, electronic home monitoring, job training, anger management, supervised probation, etc. ~ But a huge jail would consume the money needed for alternative solutions. Statement For:

Let us Help You! Restore our funding...

Black Lake Fire Department generates 98% of its revenue from a tax levy based on the assessed value of the property in our district. The area covered by the district has seen unusually rapid growth, but the district services have been unable to keep up with the growth due to the 1% limitation established by Initiative 747.

Increased manning is at stake...

Our department has three career fire personnel. Approximately 60% of the time the district relies entirely on volunteer firefighters. While our volunteers will continue to be the backbone of our service, the fire district's goal is to assure the citizens of our community that we will have minimum manning of at least one career firefighter for emergency response.

What the money will be used for...

The current rate is \$1.33/per thousand assessed value. The restored levy rate would be \$1.50/per thousand assessed value. This is an increase of \$.17 or \$25.50 a year for a home valued at \$150,000. Funds generated from the "lid lift" will be used to hire at least one firefighter and thereby increase career staffing.

Continue your support...

Your district needs your help. Restore funding to a fair level and see increased manning in your district. We will be there for you when you need us, please support us now.

Explanatory Statement:

Thurston County Fire Protection District No. 5, your Black Lake Fire Department, has placed a proposition on the May 18, 2004 ballot to authorize the property tax levy rate to return to \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. The proposition is presented to voters pursuant to Initiative 747, which otherwise limits property tax revenue to 101% of the previous year's revenue, regardless of the statutorily authorized dollar rate limitation of \$1.50.

This proposition meets the requirements of Initiative 747, which was enacted by the voters of the State of Washington in November of 2001, mandating that any increase in property tax revenue of more than 1% over the previous year be approved by the voters.

Approval of this proposition would allow the Black Lake Fire Department to increase the current level of services provided to our community. Rejection of the proposition would lead to the loss of approximately \$120,000 in projected tax revenue in 2005.

Statement For:

It's Your Fire Department and We Need Your Help:

Voters want to know where their tax money goes. The Fire Department is unique in that every dollar collected by the levy assessment stays within the district where it is collected. No Fire Department funding comes from County, State or Federal sources. Your Fire Department is funded entirely by the residents within its district.

One Percent Limitation Risks Service Delivery as Costs Continue to Rise:

Without voter approval, laws limit the District to a 1% per year budgetary increase for inflation, regardless of increasing demand for services or inflationary and other costs. Even with cutbacks and increased operational efficiency, it is impossible to meet growing demands with such limitations. Like all business, personnel, insurance and other costs have increased well above 1%. The Department's emergency 911 calls increased 17% last year, while other costs have increased over 25%.

Your Fire Department Operates Very Efficiently:

The Fire Department employs only four firefighters/EMTs, the other 60 dedicated members are volunteer firefighters/EMTs. This combination department brings to you a very high degree of professional services at the lowest possible cost.

Your Fire Department Has Collected a Lower Tax Rate Each Year Since 2001:

Since 2001 your Fire Department tax rate has decreased by \$0.18 per \$1000 assessed value. The Fire Department has not requested an increase in over ten years, however; to continue the service expected when someone calls 911, the Department is requesting a Levy Lift to re-establish the rate at the 2001 level, a \$0.18 levy increase or \$18 per year for an owner of property

with an assessed value of \$100,000.

Vote yes to continue an effective and efficient Fire Department.

Explanatory Statement:

Thurston County Fire Protection District No. 11 (Littlerock Fire Rescue) provides fire protection, rescue and emergency medical services to the largest geographical fire district in Thurston County. Existing law allows the Fire District to raise its regular property tax revenues that fund district operation and maintenance expenses by only 1% without a vote of the citizens. Due to population growth, increased demand for services and continuing inflation, the Board of Fire Commissioners has determined that a 1% increase is not adequate to cover increased cost of goods and services and other operational expenses of the District.

Passage of Proposition 1 will authorize the Fire District to re-establish the regular property tax levy rate to \$1.50, an increase of \$0.18 per \$1,000 assessed valuation, for collection in 2005. Approval of this proposition would allow the Fire District to preserve its current level of services, programs and resources.

If approved, the operations and maintenance increase to the regular property tax levy would be \$0.18 per \$1,000 assessed value.

The owner of property valued at \$100,000 would pay: \$18 per year, or \$1.50 per month, or \$ 0.34 per week.

Statement For:

Littlerock Fire Rescue Experiences Rapid Growth & Increased Emergency 911 Call Volume:

Today our emergency 911- response zone is the largest and one of the fastest growing in the County. Twenty years ago a firefighter's primary job was to put out fires. Today firefighters respond to almost all local hazards including emergency medical, car accidents, disasters, floods, rescues, wild fires, hazmat, etc., thereby significantly increasing demand for service.

Investing in Your Local Fire Department Will Improve Your Community's Emergency Preparedness:

Fire and emergency medical service facilities built in the 1970s still stand ready, and in some cases still house 24-year-old fire engines. These local stations are just garages and the equipment parked within is well beyond its life cycle. The buildings lack space for 24-hour staff, are not earthquake proof, and can't serve as disaster centers. Today's engines carry the Jaws of Life, oxygen, medical supplies and other life saving equipment and in some cases, modern fire engines will not fit in the existing fire stations.

Your Yes Vote Will Improve Your Emergency Service & Life Saving Response Times:

In an emergency every minute counts. Fire stations adequately spaced, with proper equipment, and personnel will improve critical life and property saving response times. Funding will provide for replacement of local fire stations, a new engine, water truck and aid/rescue unit. The stations' conservative design and size will maximize efficiency, be equipped as community disaster shelters, and will accommodate 24-hour staff.

Improved Fire and Emergency Medical Service at a Reasonable Cost:

The capital improvements would cost \$0.28 per \$1,000 assessed value. An owner of property valued at \$100,000 would pay \$28 per year or about \$0.53 a week.

Explanatory Statement:

Thurston County Fire Protection District No. 11 (Littlerock Fire Rescue) is the largest geographical fire district in Thurston County. Currently, fire protection, rescue and emergency medical services are delivered primarily from a single fire station, which is the only facility in the 100 square mile Fire District capable of staffing firefighters and emergency medical technicians. The other facilities were built in the 1970s and lack space to accommodate firefighters around the clock and in some cases, will not accommodate modern fire apparatus.

Passage of Proposition 2 will authorize the District to incur debt and to issue and sell bonds for no more than \$2,998,000 to modernize and improve its firefighting and emergency medical facilities by acquiring, constructing and equipping new fire stations and acquiring additional fire apparatus and firefighting and other life saving equipment. The capital improvement projects are planned to distribute fire department resources over a larger region of the Fire District to improve life saving response times, accommodate growth and replace equipment that has exceeded its service life. The bonds will be paid from annual excess property taxes levied by the district, and will mature within twenty (20) years.

3 Things You *NEED* to Know!!

How to Vote? Say goodbye to “Chad”. Punchcard voting is in the process of being phased-out. Soon, Thurston County voters will be using Optical Scan technology. No more hanging, dangling, pregnant, or swinging chads!!

How You Vote? As you may be aware, Washington State’s Primary Election system is in the midst of major changes. The blanket primary has been ruled unconstitutional. We are currently planning on holding a Montana style Primary Election in September. This will involve voters selecting a single party’s ballot, and voting only on candidates in that party. This will be FOR THE SEPTEMBER PRIMARY ELECTION ONLY. The court’s ruling in no way affects the way you vote in the General Election.

More changes may come between now and September, so watch for news of Primary Election changes. Call the Elections Department at (360)786-5408 or check our website (below) for more information or clarification of changes to the Primary. Our September Local Voters’ Pamphlet will include the most up-to-date information.

Can You Vote? With the passage of new federal regulations, first-time voters may be required to provide valid identification at the polls, or to provide copies of their Washington State ID with their absentee ballots. If you registered after JANUARY 1, 2003, and are unsure if this requirement applies to you, please call our office for clarification.

The Thurston County Auditor’s Office remains committed to ensuring all individuals are informed and educated about their voting rights.
